## WEEKLY PRAYER IN ACTION IN FRANKFORT

The Kentucky Council of Churches is hosting Prayer in Action Days at the State Capitol each Tuesday during the General Assembly to pray for government officials and act on behalf of Kentucky's most vulnerable citizens. The gatherings are a continuation of the Interfaith Day of Action held in September of 2016. A number of Disciples clergy, including Dalene, attended.

The 2017 gatherings will include prayer, education on issues, and a call to action, hoping to "engage religious leaders and their congregants in direction justice advocacy." (KY Council of Churches.)

Prayer in Action Days are inspired by Moral Mondays in North Carolina, where religious leaders created significant change in policies that oppressed the poor and people of color. In 2016, the Council of Churches partnered with Repairs of the Breach, a national organization led by Moral Monday leader Rev. Dr. William Barber. Interim Director of the Kentucky Council of Churches, Rev. Peggy Hinds stated, "These events inspired more progressive faith leaders to speak out against racism, xenophobia, and unjust social policies. We want to continue that momentum in 2017."

Beginning January 10, each Prayer in Action event will focus on a different social issue like minimum wage, justice reform, healthcare, and gun violence. The Kentucky Council of Churches chooses the issues based on policy statements approved by all 11 of the Council's denominational members. The membership includes Protestant and Roman Catholic congregations. The Council works with other state advocacy groups and coalitions on these issues, and many of them have committed to support the Prayer in Action Days.

If you are interested in learning more about the Prayer in Action Days, being a part of a congregational discussion and/or joining fellow Christians in Frankfort one or more Tuesdays, contact Dalene.

### **GREEN CHALICE**

### More 'Bench for Caps' News



Woodland's Creation Care team will be joining the ABC Promise Partnership program that collects plastic lids and caps that will be turned into a bench for

placement somewhere in or outside of the church.

**ORIGIN**: ABC was designed for school-age children by a team of six eighth graders in 2010 as their entry in a nationwide academic competition in community problem-solving topic: recycling.

<u>PURPOSE</u>: This "partnership" between children and Green Tree Plastics is to be a tool for teaching children about caring for the earth.

**OWNERSHIP**: The bench is to belong to the children and be placed where they want it to be placed in order that they may show others the results of their work and the value of recycling.

### HERE'S HOW IT WORKS . . .

- The children are the primary workers in the collecting from Woodland's recycling bin, sorting, and tallying the weight.
- Members of the Creation Care team will act as "mentors" along with each group's teacher. They will supervise the sorting to ensure that only acceptable lids and caps are collected.
- Groups involved may include the Faith Finders Sunday school, Worship & Wonder, and Village Montessori. There may even be an inter-generational Sunday set aside where all ages will be involved in the sorting.

**THE GOAL**: To purchase a 4-foot heavy-duty, plastic bench, 200 pounds of lids and caps will be needed. That's about five fifty-gallon trash bags full of lids and caps.

HOW YOU CAN HELP: Ask friends and neighbors to collect lids and caps (info sheets on ACCEPTABLE lids/caps are at the church on the Green Chalice bulletin board near the elevator). Please keep them handy as reminders. Bring full bags or boxes to church and leave near the Recycle Bin near the elevator to be picked up by a child from one of the groups.

Many thanks to Wes Bullock and Eamonn Fitzgerald for their help with the Fair-Trade sale in December. They are the newest members of Woodland's Creation Care team.
